MINUTES OF THE 222ND ANNUAL CONVENTION

Friday, October 20, 2006

Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford, Connecticut

In accordance with the Constitution of the Diocese of Connecticut, the 222nd Annual Convention of the Diocese was held on Friday, October 20 and Saturday, October 21, 2006, in a place designated by the Bishop with the consent of the Diocesan Executive Council, viz, Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford, Connecticut. Following registration in the Cathedral House at 12:00 p. m. the Convention was called to order at 1:00 p. m. by the president of the Convention, the Rt. Rev. Andrew D. Smith, bishop of Connecticut. The Bishop introduced the dean of the Cathedral, the Very Rev. Mark Pendleton.

Dean Pendleton welcomed the Convention members and guests to a "gift-wrapped cathedral," a reference to the tarp covering the outside of the cathedral, part of their restoration project. He also called attention to the Peace Village set up in the auditorium and to the art installation in the Founder's Porch, created by St. John's North Haven.

The Bishop reminded the convention to not offer applause during business sessions of Convention. He asked that

people use baptized names when introducing and addressing one another at Convention. He also asked for those with cell phones or pagers to turn them off during convention.

The Bishop then introduced the Rt. Rev. Catherine S. Roskam, bishop suffragan of the Diocese of New York. Bishop Roskam served as the chaplain for the Convention and preacher at the Evensong on Friday and the Eucharist on Saturday.

The Rt. Rev. Catherine Roskam led the convention in opening devotions and the hymn, *The Church's One Foundation*.

The Bishop introduced the Rev. Deacon Marge Roccoberton, Canon to the Ordinary, and the Rev. Dr. Laura J. Ahrens, Secretary of Convention. He also introduced Canon Jack Spaeth, Canon for Stewardship and Administration, Canon Ed Hebb, Chancellor, and Guy Cambria, Treasurer of the Diocese. He also introduced the Rev. Joanne Munro, Canon for Deployment.

The President requested that the Rev. Mark Robinson, president of the Standing Committee, present the certification of the roll of the clergy.

REPORT OF CREDENTIALS

The Bishop and clerical members of the Standing Committee, in accordance with Canon XIII, at a meeting on 19 October 2006, prepared a roll of clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and entitled to a seat and vote at the annual Convention on 20 and 21 October 2006. The roll is submitted herewith:

The Bishop thanked Mark for his service as president of the Standing Committee.

At the request of Bishop Smith, Sylvia Ho, lay member of the Standing Committee, presented the credentials for the lay order as follows (Theresa Sharp, secretary, was unable to attend the convention):

The Secretary of the Diocese and the lay members of the Standing Committee in Accordance with Canon XIII, at a meeting on 19 October 2006, examined the list of lay delegates to the Convention and report as follows:

We have carefully examined the certificates of election and have verified the names of all delegates and substitutes properly attested and the roll is submitted herewith: 263 qualified lay delegates.

In addition there are 19 lay members of the Executive Council, 5 lay members of the Standing Committee and 12 elected lay deans and sub-deans who are ex-officio members of the Convention with voice and vote. This is a total of 299 lay delegates.

The Bishop thanked Theresa Sharp for her service as secretary of the Standing Committee.

He also reminded the Convention that all votes were taken by show of hands not by voice.

On motion both rolls were accepted and upon vote of the Convention a roll call was dispensed with. Registration data showed that 188 clergy and 154 lay delegates and substitutes were present on October 20, 2006, representing 141 parishes and mission stations. In addition, there were 63 clergy and lay visitors registered during the Convention.

The Bishop then nominated the Rev. Dr. Laura J. Ahrens as Secretary of Convention. On motion the nominations were closed, the vote taken, and Laura Ahrens was declared elected. The Bishop then appointed the following assistant secretaries: June Aziz, Joan Bray, the Rev. Michel Belt, Melissa Haas, the Rev. K. Dexter Cheney, the Rev. Agnes Johnson, the Rev. Robert Stocksdales and the Rev. Amy Welin. The Bishop appointed the following as tellers: in the clerical order, the Rev. Bruce Torrey as chief teller, with the Rev. Jane White-Hassler. In the lay order, June Aziz as chief teller together with Stephen Cobb, Bob Kissell and Mary Schinke. Canon Spaeth and Chancellor Hebb were appointed to assist.

The Bishop then introduced the Rev. Carol Hoidra and Erik Haas who would serve as runners during the Convention.

The Bishop then asked for nominations for Secretary of the Diocese. Canon John W. Spaeth III was nominated and elected.

The Rev. Thomas J. Furrer, chair of the Nominations Committee, presented the list of nominees for the various committees, commissions and boards. He referred people to the handout in their Convention packets. Names in italics indicated new appointees.

The Rev. Tom Furrer moved that the nominations on behalf of the Nominations Committee be approved as presented. By show of hand these appointments were approved. The Bishop asked that the Bishop and Diocesan Executive Council be given authority to fill any vacancies which might occur in the interim between Conventions. The motion was seconded and adopted.

Bishop Smith noted that he would introduce and recognize visitors during the Bishop's Address. Bishop Smith then thanked Dr. Calvin E. Woodland, president of Capital Community College, for offering the facilities of the college for use by the Convention. He also thanked Dr. Woodland and the staff at the Community College for their hospitality.

The Rev. Laura Ahrens reminded the Convention attendees that the voting delegates should be together on the main floor or in the balcony under the organ pipes so that counting procedures could be expedited. Non-canonically resident interim pastors and assistant clergy were advised they could sit with their delegation, but were asked to refrain from voting, as only members of Convention have voice and vote. Dr. Ahrens announced that the Resolutions Committee was to meet at the foot of the chancel stairs prior to the Friday workshops, and that the Committee on the Bishop's Address would meet in the Dean's office during the workshops. People were directed to see Canon Spaeth or Laura Ahrens if they needed any printing, copying and securing of caucus rooms. No unauthorized material was to be distributed during con-

vention without the approval of the Secretary of Convention.

Bishop Smith asked the Rev. Cn. Marge Roccoberton to recognize and introduce clergy new to the Diocese and clergy in new cures.

Canon Roccoberton introduced four groups of clergy: 2006 ordinands from the Diocese of Connecticut, ordinands from outside of the Diocese, clergy new to the Diocese and clergy in new placements.

The Order of the Day was adopted as presented.

The Chancellor reminded the Convention of the Special Order of the Day adopted in May 1983: "Anyone moving the adoption of a resolution may speak to it for up to five minutes. Any subsequent speakers pro or con will be limited to two minutes each. No one may speak a second time to the same resolution until all others wishing to speak have done so." He also reminded delegates that they were to address the chair as "Mr. President." Delegates addressing the Convention must do so from the floor microphone. No parliamentary motions will be honored unless the delegate is at a floor microphone. Seconds may be made from the seats without moving to a microphone and likewise a call for a "point of order" from the seats as well, after which a person asking for a point of order must move to a microphone to explain his or her point at the direction of the chair.

The Secretary of Convention was designated timekeeper.

The Rt. Rev. Andrew Smith noted that all votes would be taken by a show of hands or by standing, and not by voice, to accommodate the non-hearing communities and offer a more accurate way to record voting. Bishop Smith noted that the resolutions for Convention were made available to delegates in the September Convention mailing. Any resolutions submitted following the resolution deadline needed a two-thirds majority of Convention to be admitted to the floor of Convention.

The Bishop asked if there were any resolutions that had not been submitted by the deadline. The Rev. Joe Pace, Chair of the Resolutions Committee presented a resolution on the merger of St. John's by the Sea, West Haven and Christ Church, West Haven into one parish to be named The Church of the Holy Spirit, West Haven.

RESOLUTION #9 – To Merge the Parishes of Christ Church, West Haven and St. John's by the Sea, West Haven into one parish.

Resolved: That under the provisions of Canon I, Section 16 of the Constitutions and Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut, the Bishop and Standing Committee have approved the merger of the parishes of Christ Episcopal Church, West Haven and St. John's by the Sea Episcopal Church, West Haven, into one parish to be known as Church of the Holy Spirit Episcopal Church, West Haven, and be it further

Resolved: That the action of the Bishop and Standing Committee be ratified by the 222nd Annual Convention and that the new parish congregation of the Church of the Holy Spirit Episcopal Church, West Haven be welcomed into union with the Diocese of Connecticut, and that their representatives be recognized at this time.

Submitted by the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Connecticut.

The Rev. Mark Robinson, President of the Standing Committee, spoke to why the resolution was not submitted by the resolutions deadline. He explained that the deadline for submitting resolutions preceded the September 21st meeting of the Standing Committee.

The Bishop asked whether or not the Convention would consider this resolution.

According to the provisions of the 1973 Standing Resolution of the Canons of the Diocese of Connecticut, two-thirds vote is required to place the resolution on the floor for the Convention for its business session. It passed, admitting it into business on Saturday. The resolution was referred to the Committee on Resolutions to review and provide copies to the Convention prior to the business session Saturday.

There were no further resolutions to come before the Convention.

Members and guests took a three-minute stretch in place, as suggested by the Bishop.

The Bishop then called the Convention back to order. He announced that if there were visitors for whom the balcony was not accessible, they were more than welcome to find a seat on the main floor. He then gave his annual address to the Convention.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

Where to begin? I think it's best to begin with prayer.

Gracious Father, we pray now for ourselves, gathered in Convention, and for all your holy Catholic Church. Where we are corrupt, purify us. Where we are in error, direct us. Where in anything we are amiss, reform us. Where we are right, strengthen us. Where we are in want, provide for us. Where we are divided, reunite us. We pray these blessings only for the sake of Jesus Christ your Son and our Savior. Amen.

It has been and it is a very full year. We are seeing significant changes in mission and ministry and we stand at some important thresholds. In this address, I will talk about the reality we face with the continuing actions by five of our congregations against the bishop and the diocese. I will offer a change in our church's policies for ministry with and care for persons in committed same-sex relationships. Also I want to look at some realities of parish and diocesan stewardship and finances.

Let's begin by looking outward. For even in the midst of the hard issues of these times there arises from within the Church a glad energy and commitment to the mission for God in this world that grows and grows. Mission. More and more parishes are seeking partnerships, in some cases with other parishes in Connecticut and overseas, in some cases with whole dioceses. Mission trips by youth and adults, the building of churches, schools, and clinics, visits by clergy and bishops, have awakened us to one another across the world and have strengthened our ties within the Anglican Communion.

For us as your bishops, many of the Anglican connections are new and we absolutely cherish them. Bishop Curry

celebrated Holy Week last spring in the city of Maputo and in the countryside of southern Mozambique. His two-week visit was life changing: ask him about it! He came home filled with new joy in Christ, and talked lots about the Rt. Rev. Dinis Sengulane, Bishop of Lebombo. This week that new relationship has deepened. We are so honored by the visit of Bishop Sengulane, the Very Rev. Agostinho Buque and Miss Marinela Chachine of the Diocese of Lebombo. They are special guests of Saint John's Essex, with whom they have a companion relationship through Roger LeCompte, a Volunteer in Mission of The Episcopal Church. They are here in Convention with us this weekend. Bishop Sengulane will be our keynote speaker tomorrow. Our brothers and sister in Christ Jesus, from the top bottom and middle of our hearts, welcome, welcome, welcome. We greet you in Christ Church Cathedral and thank you for your prayers for us and ask you to carry our greetings to the Cathedral of St. Augustine in Lebombo.

I was privileged to visit another part of the Anglican Communion last February: the island nation and Diocese of Mauritius. The occasion was the installation of the Most Rev. Ian Ernest as Archbishop of the Province of the Indian Ocean. Bishop Ernest had spent sabbatical time in the United States; we had spent an afternoon in conversation together in Hartford, so it was an absolute joy to bring greetings from the Episcopal Church to Archbishop Ernest as he began this new ministry as Primate. It was a joy to welcome him back when he visited his friends in Saint Mark's Storrs again last May.

Also today we welcome Bishop John Danbinta, Bishop of the Diocese of Gusau, Archdiocese of Kaduna, Province of Nigeria. Bishop Danbinta is on leave from his diocese to study Islam and Christianity in residence at the Hartford Seminary, and his spiritual home in Connecticut is Trinity Church Tariffville. Welcome to Bishop Ernest M. Shalita, who served forty-four years as priest and bishop in the Diocese of Muhabura in the Province of Uganda. Bishop Shalita is the guest of Grace Church Old Saybrook.

Bishops are here from all over. Thank you, Bishop Cathy Roskam, neighbor and friend of Connecticut from New York, for serving as chaplain to this Convention. Thank you, Bishop Duncan Gray of Mississippi, for your close relationship with St. Barnabas Greenwich, and for traveling north to tell us of the rebuilding in the Gulf Coast.

Our call to mission is here in the United States too. How many individuals and parishes have sent mission work groups to the Gulf Coast to help with the unbelievable task of cleaning and eventual rebuilding from the destruction of Katrina and Rita, the hurricanes which struck over a year ago? How many more should go! We welcome Bishop Duncan Gray of the Diocese of Mississippi to our midst, and, Duncan, we are eager to hear your witness and receive your invitation as your companions in Christ.

Our Connecticut fellowship extends to our companion Diocese of Colombia. I bring greetings to this Convention from Obispo Francisco Duque, who was with us last year at this Convention.

I express my deep appreciation to Wilfrido Ramos for his extensive and effective ministry among us as Bishop Suffragan of Connecticut. He now is Bishop of the Diocese of Ecuador Central, and I am happy to report he is filled with energy for the huge challenge of that new ministry. With his departure to serve in Ecuador, Bishop Curry and the staff and I have attempted to assume oversight in "his" ministries, and we have realized even more the extent of his work, and what a gentle and pastoral presence he has been among us. Do keep Bishop Ramos in prayer, and go visit him every so often.

Speaking of bishops, today I want to recognize a friend and mentor who celebrates a significant milestone anniversary, twenty-five years of active-active and retired-active episcopal ministry to the Church. Bishop Clarence Coleridge. Ordained a bishop on October 23, 1981, he served as Bishop Suffragan for thirteen years, and was elected and then became our diocesan in 1993. Since he first retired from "us" in 1999, Bishop Coleridge has served as Assisting Bishop for Charles Bennison in Pennsylvania, where the two bishops have modeled the breadth of theology and the unity of service which are hallmarks of Anglicanism. And now he is prepared to retire again. We welcome Clarence home, we praise God for him, and we pray every blessing for Bishop Coleridge and Euna Coleridge in their new home at Seabury Continuing Care retirement Community in Bloomfield. Personally I express my gratitude to him for his many gifts, including the gift of his friendship and wisdom. And I thank both Bishop Coleridge and Bishop Rowthorn who have offered themselves for delegated episcopal pastoral oversight in Connecticut, to help us seek ways to move forward, reconciled and united, for the sake of the gospel.

All things do work together for good to those who love the Lord, and I believe our new awareness and relationships within the Anglican Communion are a blessing which has grown directly from the theological engagements of the past years.

First I will address our relationship with five congregations and their rectors who petitioned for what they name alternative episcopal oversight in May 2004. I have refrained from speaking publicly because I have wanted to keep the matter of our relationships and the possibility for reconciliation "in house," and I have wanted to avoid giving occasion for the immediate public attacks that inevitably have followed any statement which does not support their cause. However, today I must take some time to speak.

The basic issues - diocesan episcopal oversight of these parishes, and the obedience of the rectors to their ordination vows - have not changed to this day. In their letter to me of May 2004, the clergy and lay leaders of these parishes named "alternative" or "adequate" episcopal oversight as their expectation, and outlined in detail what alternative episcopal oversight would mean to them. It is clear, as I have said over and over, that their demands lie outside any possibility for the Episcopal Church. To put it another way, were a bishop to accede to their conditions, he or she would have failed to uphold the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Within our polity there are two alternatives for the five congregations and their rectors: Either live in compliance with the Church's Constitution and Canons which means serving in communion with the Diocese of Connecticut and our bishops - which still includes the offering of delegated episcopal pastoral oversight; Or leave this church.

Rather than choose either of those options, this small group of parishes, clearly with support from outside this diocese, chose to initiate legal and ecclesiastical action against the bishop and other members of our diocese on several fronts. Our response has required significant time, energy, and financial resources during this past year, and it certainly has diverted us from full attention to the nurture of our diocesan life and witness.

They have brought three actions against us: first, A suit in federal court primarily over the matter of Saint John's Church, Bristol; second, Charges placed before the Presiding Bishop challenging my use of canons in the actions I took to remove the leadership of Saint John's; and third, An appeal to the Archbishop of Canterbury for consideration of their request for alternative episcopal oversight by the Archbishop's Panel of Reference.

An update.

The Archbishop of Canterbury withdrew the complaint from the Panel of Reference because the petitioners had also initiated civil and ecclesiastical litigation. The Archbishop and the Panel reasoned that the civil and ecclesiastical suits seek judgment through adversarial action, whereas the purpose of the Panel of Reference is to seek reconciliation. Because the complainants pursue litigation, the Archbishop will not consider their complaint

Six months after the filing, the federal suit and its accompanying motions were dismissed in their entirety by Judge Arterton in late August.

The ecclesiastical charges currently are in the hands of the Review Committee for the Ecclesiastical Court for the Trial of a Bishop. This month investigating attorneys for the Review Committee conducted several days of extensive interviews here in Connecticut, and they plan to continue with more investigative interviews later this month. At some time in the future those attorneys will report to the Review Committee, who then must decide whether to bring Presentment, which then would bring a trial in a court of the Episcopal Church. At this time, contrary to statements issued by the American Anglican Council and others, I am not under Presentment.

We are not before the Panel of Reference, the federal case has been dismissed, and the ecclesiastical charges remain under investigation.

In the meantime, for these past two years the five parishes and their clergy have continued to enjoy the benefits of The Episcopal Church while at the same time they refuse to contribute to our life and mission and they continue to pursue their own agenda. To turn a simile, it's been a little like flying an airplane while some of the crew are working to dismantle it.

The agenda? In the press and in private communications they and their spokespersons continually misrepresent the issues and impugn the motives and character of this bishop. They refuse to support our common mission and life financially: in 2005, of the five parishes, two parishes contributed nothing toward our diocesan budget, and for the other three the contribution average for the year was \$430.00. They have refused to fulfill their canonical requirements to enable the bishops' visitations. In one instance their members were stopped from receiving communion in a diocesan pre-convention meeting. Members from the five congregations have visited other parishes to recruit "converts." They held a service and a public rally on the grounds of the state capitol in which they denounced "false shepherds." The numerous allegations, complaints and motions, each of which we have had to answer, to date have cost us more than \$350,000 in legal fees.

Without even the courtesy of a call, much less seeking permission, they have invited breakaway bishops into our diocese for meetings and public events. Some of the clergy themselves are featured speakers at convocations which advocate the division of this church.

The benefits they enjoy? They purchase insurance coverage under our diocesan plans for the health and life of their clergy and liability coverage for property and casualty claims. They continue to make contributions to the Church Pension Fund of the Episcopal Church for the future benefit of their clergy. They profit from tax privileged status under our diocesan exemption (which exemption they also have challenged in court). They have the ability to attend and participate and vote at this Convention. They have the privilege of unfettered use of property held in trust for the mission and ministry of the very diocese and bishop whom they repudiate.

There are several new incidents from the past several weeks.

First, the five clergy and their lay leaders have now appealed the federal decision by Judge Arterton. Addressing the Second Circuit Court of Appeals in New York, they are seeking a reversal of Judge Arterton's ruling and in that appeal they seek damages of five million dollars. We will defend against that appeal.

Second, last week the lead attorney for these members of our diocese sent a message to the attorneys representing us to give notice that they plan to file a new suit in Connecticut's Superior Court. In that same message there followed a lengthy demand that the bishop reach settlement with the plaintiffs. Settlement? Settle what? Settle with us or we sue? That sounds like a threat to me, in the way of the world, unworthy of Christ.

Third, on October 12, again last week, in an article about the litigation in the Darien News a priest from one of the five parishes was quoted, "I would tell the bishop that if he was to let us remain Anglican we would drop the pending lawsuit and call it a draw."

Wait a minute. First of all, we are Anglican. Whatever anyone else may say, or hope, we are Anglicans, you and I, and that's because we are the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut, a member diocese of The Episcopal Church, a member church of the Anglican Communion.

All along I thought the pending lawsuit was principally about Saint John's Bristol. Now we understand that they are willing to drop the charges concerning Saint John's if they get what they seek for themselves?

It now appears that the legal actions are not the main event, but tactics intended to cost us and back us into a corner and bully us into submission. Makes me think of the little book "Hardball on Holy Ground". All this activity appears purposefully designed to bring this diocese to our knees. Is this really a matter of winning and losing or "calling it a draw"? And this is of Jesus?

Let me be clear: I cannot and will not grant a status – alternative episcopal oversight -- that is not permitted by the canons of our Church. Again, let me be clear: I have never spoken of or offered "settlement" in any conversation, public or private. "Settlement" is language of the law courts, introduced by their attorney. Reconciliation is the language of Christ. We are people of Christ, and my hope has been and is for reconciliation.

We are well aware of the canonical actions that are available to the diocese. They are serious. We have been patient.. We continue to hold open the door. Yet it is time to say, Enough. The passive nonsupport and the active sabotage of the

diocese by the leaders of these five congregations and those who support them from the outside are a scandal in the community and before the Lord, and they cannot continue.

To the clergy and members of the five congregations. Perhaps in your mind or in meetings some of you already have made the decision to leave this church. Perhaps you are caught in this fray. It is time for your yes be yes, and your no be no. If one church, or two churches, or all five churches will return to the life and mission and communion of this Church, and, clergy, if you will honor your ordination vows, the door is wide open. If you cannot tolerate the life and openness of The Episcopal Church, then honorably move on. Above all, stop the whining and the destructive behavior which diminish all of us and the Lord Jesus. This Church has gospel work before us, and we have been more than patient, and the attacks continue and it is time for us to say, enough!

What most hurts, in addition to our severely strained relationships in Christ, is the active nurturing of dissension and the diversion of our attention and assets away from our mission and ministry. While we could be saving thousands of children and adults who will die today of malaria, while we could be building and staffing churches and schools and clinics, while we could be forming microeconomic enterprises, while we could be supporting mission and missionaries abroad and here in Connecticut, we have been compelled to devote our resources and attention to five parishes and their demand for accommodations we cannot grant. Enough.

The root of the controversy is what kind of church this will be, what our gospel values and imperatives are, how we shall live and minister. Shall we be a church of generosity, or of judgment? The focus in this question is whether this church will accept as full and valued members persons who are followers of Jesus and who are gay and lesbian. We are divided by theology and experience, and we hold different perspectives and some of us hold those perspectives very strongly. For many years we have been living uneasily with the divisions, and the controversy has caused pain and anguish on all sides, on all sides. There has been no movement on the question within the Anglican Communion, certainly no movement to consensus.

I believe in my heart and soul that it is time for this church, this diocese, formally to acknowledge and support and bless our sisters and brothers who are gay and lesbian, including those who are living in faithful and faith-filled committed partnerships, as followers of Jesus and faithful members of the Church.

When I became diocesan bishop seven years ago, I modified the Connecticut policy that had been in place, so that as of 1999, same-sex orientation and a committed same-sex partnership no longer would in themselves disqualify a person from being ordained or placed in a pastoral cure in the Diocese of Connecticut. The next year the Bishop and Diocesan Executive Council extended health benefits to same-sex partners.

The reality of same-sex relationships came squarely into the public eye with the election and consecration of Bishop Robinson in 2003, and again with the surprising passage of the law for civil unions in Connecticut in 2005.

Within The Episcopal Church as a whole we have responded to these events more with strong conclusions than with open dialogue. Last spring I gathered a diverse group of lay persons and clergy who, after much necessary dialogue among themselves, offered the first two of what we hoped would be a larger series of public discussions in the diocese on Scripture and Sexuality. One gathering was in the Bridgeport Deanery, a second was offered before General Convention in West Hartford. They were sparsely attended which was, I believe, a reflection of our lack of will to engage the issues or to listen deeply with one another. I particularly missed the people who have claimed that we cannot make changes because we have not had dialogue. I am deeply grateful to Dr. Borden Painter and all who worked so hard for these forums. They are now preparing material that will be available for discussion in parish study groups.

Again, at the heart of the matter is whether we as a Church will welcome and embrace and serve with and care for and bless persons who are homosexual and partnered as cherished and fully accepted members of the Body of Christ. I believe it is right to change our current policy which prohibits our clergy from blessing same-sex relationships. The debate and vote on Resolution 6 in the 221st Annual Convention of this diocese last year clearly indicated a desire for a change.

There are several verses of Scripture that have been used for argument over and over by folk from every side.

What has not been heard, however, is the sweep of Scripture witness in which Jesus and later the apostles over and over open up new dimensions of what it can mean to live in faithful relationships with God and one another and the whole world. Without question there I see a progression of revelation, beginning with our Lord's inclusion of women among his disciples. It continues as Peter and then Paul recognize that in the New Covenant faith is not about family lineage, dietary laws or the Biblically mandated mark of circumcision, but about accepting Jesus, and receiving the gifts and bringing forth the fruits of the Spirit.

It is convincing to me as I read the New Testament and also see how the implications of the person of Jesus and his teaching and actions continue to unfold in new ways in the Church. Even though we continually slip back into old ways, there have been triumphant breakthroughs in new ways: equality regardless of nationality or social classes, equality regardless of being male or female, equality regardless of age, and equality regardless of race.

Was the Church in the forefront of all of these new understandings, leading the way? In reality we the Church struggled with those issues sometimes against and often with the rest of the culture. And so it is now.

Jesus' ministry so radically redefines what life in faith is that, says Jesus, it is a call to a new realm, the Kingdom of God. Both Jesus and Saint Paul say that entrance into it means dying and being born over again. Because I see this teaching and its implications unfolding in the Bible and through history, I believe that God continues to open our eyes to new insights and truths of living in faith.

I believe that it is time for us to re-think, re-pray and re-form our theology and our pastoral practices, to welcome, recognize, support and bless the lives and faith of brothers and sisters who are gay and lesbian in the equal fullness of Christian fellowship.

In addition to the witness of Scripture and our history, what convinces me that this is a right place for the Church has been the clear, patient Christian witness of the many, many members of the church who are lesbian and gay.

It is the witness of the focused faith and pure charity of so many gay and lesbian companions who seek lives blessed and lived in Christ, it is the patience and endurance with which our gay sisters and brothers run the race – sometimes openly, sometimes hidden – it is knowing first-hand their struggles and their sacrifice and their clear witness to the love and power of the risen Christ that has brought me to say yes.

Many times, in the presence of gay and lesbian brothers and sisters, I have felt a little like Peter in the house of Cornelius. Recognizing the presence of God where it wasn't supposed to be, in a pagan household, Peter baptized the entire family. Like Peter, who when criticized by the elders in Jerusalem for breaking the traditions, I have said to myself, "Who am I that I can hinder God?"

Today's step is to begin to permit blessing as a pastoral ministry within a congregation.

When we talk about a pastoral ministry of blessing, we have much to think about and discern. Should clergy officiate at civil unions? I believe that we should not – they are in fact civil unions, and our Church has not made provision in our polity to address the issue. (In fact, as we think about these things, maybe we can rethink whether clergy should officiate as state agents at weddings, and we might back out of the costly, costumed pageant industry that cares more about perfect settings than faith.)

More questions arise. If a couple lives in Connecticut, should we expect that there has been a commitment in a civil union? I think that yes, there should already be a civil union. Is there a difference between a congregation's prayer for blessing, and a priest's pronouncing of blessing? Yes. What criteria should we expect of a couple for giving blessing?. What preparation should there be? How should we proceed if a former civil union has been dissolved?

As we prepare to take this step, I must be clear that we are not creating or authorizing a new sacrament. Nor are we giving a green light for public ceremonies that look and sound like weddings. Nor am I authorizing any public rite or liturgy.

What I am inviting us to do is create pastoral and prayerful occasions in which we can gather as Christians to pray and pronounce blessing. So we will be able to offer Christ's blessing for those same-sex committed partners among us who seek, in faith, the recognition, prayer and support of the Church for their lives as followers and servants of Christ.

The best place to entrust decisions concerning blessings is locally, with our clergy and the lay leadership of the parishes of the diocese. I do ask that the clergy and lay leaders of any parish of this diocese which discerns that it wishes to offer blessings for same-sex partnerships, first meet to confer with our bishops. This is new ministry, and we will be most effective as we think together and share our experiences.

For many in our diocese, this change in policy may cause anguish. There also would be anguish if we stay where we are. To open the door for an expanded pastoral ministry of blessing does take us from one unsettled situation and moves us into another. I pray that in this time we will continue to care one for another, and seek to honor and serve one another with the same compassion and forbearance with which Christ cares for us.

I am well aware that we have visiting us members of our Communion who may differ significantly from what I am offering today. Your presence is a living sign of the breadth and grace of the Anglican Communion. I ask and pray that, if you disagree with me, yet you will be tolerant, and allow us room, and pray for us in these times. For Christ calls us and prays for us to be one in him. We may be very different, and we are, and we may believe very differently, and we do, and we live and serve in very different worlds -- yet the Scriptures define us as one Body for reconciliation and peace, and for the poor of this world.

Our next, perennial topic is stewardship. Stewardship continues to challenge us in the diocese. We are increasingly aware that the earth's climate and very life are changing, deteriorating, because we consume the earth's resources for our own benefit. Likewise we should become increasingly aware that our parish life and the Church's mission are impoverished because we use and keep so much of our personal resources for our own benefit.

We have many parishes, including historic "cardinal" city churches, that have inherited buildings far larger than are necessary for their life and mission, buildings built in another age of cheap energy. And smaller parishes face their own challenges, stretching resources to make ends meet.

Part of our answer of course is gospel-based stewardship. One of my great joys in the past several years has been to travel with Canon Jack Spaeth in a teaching ministry for parish mission development and stewardship. Our hope is to hold up the full gospel clearly and without apology, as a call to mission and generosity with wealth. Our delight is when people "get it," and respond with new spirit and hope, a new vision of liberality and increasing giving, all rooted in the sacrifice of Christ who gave himself.

But part of the answer about the future also is in creative thinking within and between our parishes. What do you do when you have inherited 38,000 square feet of floor space, or have to replace a half acre of slate roof, and also are committed to care for the poor and homeless, and the endowment is dwindling fast? There is no sure fix.

The challenges of stewardship and mission are before us, and the days of reckoning move closer. The challenge is to draw ourselves into new thinking and creativity about supporting mission and life in our parishes, our diocese, and certainly in the church beyond – all of the above --as we move further into this new century.

Finally, I want to recognize several ministries today.

My thanks to JoAnn Munro, who for six years has been a colleague on our diocesan staff. She served as Canon for Clergy Deployment, or as we now say, Canon for Transition Ministries. JoAnn learned this work, and has defined it in new ways, and has left a strong legacy with us. I wonder where her inquisitive mind and faith will lead her in the future. Blessings in your retirement, and thank you, JoAnn.

My thanks also to the people and leaders of Saint John's Church Bristol. From very troubled times, in the past year you have rallied in spirit, you have built trust anew, you have rejoiced to recapture essences of the parish's life that had been suppressed, and you have moved into the future in confidence and joy. And I express my thanks to the Rev. Susan McCone, who in the summer of 2005 accepted a call to step into a situation that was fraught with the unknown. Susan, I with the people of Saint John's am deeply grateful for the year you graciously gave, and we thank you for your sensitive,

caring, healing, priestly presence and ministry.

The gospel is about God, who is love, and Jesus' sacrifice of himself, in love, for us and for the world, that there may be new life. It's a complex fragmented world we live in, where issues and right decisions often clash, where faith requires us to trust and forgive and risk, and sometimes in the eyes of the world to be foolish or wrong. The new life in Christ the Word and the Holy Spirit is both a comfort and a struggle, for the realm of God as we know and pray for it is not here in fullness.

Yet there is no blessing greater or more important in the world than to know Jesus and live in his love. In and through everything, I ask that we remember that God is a generous God, who in Jesus lived and died as one of us, and who calls us together in new, different, and changed life. As I look to our future, I close with a hymn which long has been a favorite of mine, and whose words as I sang them recently settled a deep and mysterious peace into my heart:

*There's a wideness in God's mercy, like the wideness of the sea;
There's a kindness in his justice, which is more than liberty.
There is welcome for the sinner, and more graces for the good;
There is mercy with the Savior; there is healing in his blood.
There is no place where earth's sorrows are more felt than up in heaven;
There is no place where earth's failings have such kindly judgment given.
There is plentiful redemption in the blood that has been shed;
There is joy for all the members in the sorrows of the Head.
For the love of God is broader than the measure of the mind;
And the heart of the Eternal is most wonderfully kind.
If our love were but more faithful, we should take him at his word;
and our life would be thanksgiving for the goodness of the Lord.*

Thank you for who you are. For your steadfast faith. For your works and witness to the Gospel.
Be thankful. Be generous. Be merciful. Be inviting. To all people.
And so by grace together may we be a blessing in Christ. Amen.

The Secretary of Convention noted that copies of the Bishop's Address would be available during the break for the workshops and would be placed in the narthex and in the baptistry. Copies would also be available at registration on Saturday morning.

Following the Bishop's Address, at 2:45 p.m. Bishop Smith called upon Bishop Curry to introduce Dr. Robert Radtke, president of Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) and the Rt. Rev. Duncan Gray, III, Bishop of Mississippi.

Dr. Radtke spoke on the work of ERD and thanked the Diocese of Connecticut for its generosity. He focused his discussion on ERD's work with disaster response, healthcare concerns and food security. He invited individuals and parishes to be involved with the work of ERD through prayer, advocacy and hands-on ministries.

The Rt. Rev. Duncan Gray spoke of the on-going work and ministry in the Diocese of Mississippi and thanked the Diocese of Connecticut for its generous response. He spoke of his vision for relief, rebuilding and redevelopment within his diocese. He also noted that many of the volunteers who have come to the Gulf Coast have found themselves transformed by their service.

The Bishop thanked both speakers for calling us to the Gospel mission.

At 3:30 p.m., Bishop Smith called upon Jean Handler, executive director of Camp Washington. As she is not a delegate to Convention, Ms. Handler needed a vote of Convention to speak. Receiving this approval, Ms. Handler reported that the Camp had an incredible opportunity to embark on a renovation and restoration of the cabins due to a sale of some property. She also spoke with excitement of the life and programs of the Camp. She referred us to the website www.campwashington.org. Bishop Smith thanked Ms. Handler for her leadership.

Bishop Smith then called upon the Rev. Judith Greene to report to the Convention on behalf of the Commission on Liturgy and Music. She spoke to and referred people to the written report on the blessing of same-sex unions available in the Convention packet. The Commission on Liturgy and Music had been asked by last year's Convention to: Gather and survey materials that have been created and/or used in the Episcopal Church or other denominations for the purpose of blessing same-sex unions; Study and discuss those materials; Report to the 222nd Convention of the Diocese in October, 2006 to provide information from various church communities, as a resource to Convention, in light of the State of Connecticut's Statute on Civil Unions.

The Bishop then referred the Convention to the list of members of the Nominating Committee for the Election of a Bishop Suffragan provided in the registration packets. He noted the Nominating Committee had included a questionnaire in those packets which they asked people to fill out and return to the committee. He then called upon the Rev. Eleanor Applewhite Terry, chair of the committee, to address the Convention. She noted that members of the Nominating Committee would be in the reception room of the Cathedral at 3:30 p.m. for those who wanted to speak to them, and would also be available after the evening's banquet and during lunch on Saturday. She said these were open forums to which everyone was invited to come and share their comments.

Bishop Smith noted that the candidates running for Standing Committee would be available for conversation during registration on Saturday at 8:00 a.m. Bios had been included in the Convention packets. Candidates would be wearing yellow name buttons, for identification.

The Bishop then called upon the Rev. Dr. Laura Ahrens, Secretary of Convention, to introduce the nine workshops and their locations. Workshops were to conclude at 5:15 p.m. Dr. Ahrens referred people to the flyer provided in the Convention packet outlining the nine workshops. She then read their titles, leaders and locations, urging parish delegations to split up so that they would experience a variety of the offerings.

The workshops were: Engaging Children and Youth with the MDGs led by Sharon Ely Pearson and Emily Perow;

Connecticut Solutions to Ending Homelessness led by the Rev. Richard Schuster, Diane Randall and Kate Kelly; Habitat for Humanity – Building on Faith led by Robert P. Bagioni, Jennifer Schimmel and the Rev. Carl Reynolds; This Old House of Worship led by Carol Wilson and Rabbi Andrea Cohen-Kierner; Darkness into Day: Restoring Hope in the Wake of Katrina led by the Rt. Rev. Duncan M. Gray III, the Rev. Robert Alves, Donald Romanik and Anne Ditzler; AWE – A Women’s Voice led by the Rev. Gail Keeney-Mulligan, Kate Smith, Kim Polhemus, the Rev. JoAnne Graham and the Rt. Rev. Catherine Roskam; Mission Partnership with the Diocese of Lebombo in Mozambique: Listening to the voice of another church on the Gospel led by the Rt. Rev. Dinis Sengulane and Roger B. LeCompte; How to be part of the Great American Tradition of Refugee Resettlement led by Chris George and the Rev. Linda Spiers; and Liturgies for the Blessing of Same Sex Unions led by the Rev. Judith Semple Greene, the Rev. Dana Campbell, the Rev. William Hardwick and the Rev. Canon Robert Brooks. All workshops were held at Capital Community College, 950 Main Street. Available throughout the Convention was the opportunity to experience and pray for peace at a “Peace Village” set up in the Cathedral’s auditorium.

At the conclusion of the workshops, members of the Convention assembled in the Cathedral for Evensong at 5:30 p.m. The Rev. Don Hamer, rector of Trinity Church, Hartford, was officiant. The Rt. Rev. Catherine Roskam, bishop suffragan of the Diocese of New York was the homilist. Music was offered by the choir of the Trinity Church, Hartford. Their music director and organist is Bert Landman.

Following Evensong, the delegates adjourned to 960 Main Street for a banquet.

Saturday, October 21st

7:30 a.m. Morning Prayer at Christ Church Cathedral led by the Rev. Dr. Allison St. Louis, vicar, Christ Church Cathedral.

8:00 a.m. Registration and first ballot. Meet the candidates at registration at 960 Main Street

9:00 a.m. Bishop Smith announced that the first ballot was closed.

Registration data showed that 189 clergy and 228 lay delegates were present on October 21, 2006.

The Rev. Dr. Laura Ahrens reminded people to turn off their cell phones. She also reminded the Convention that votes would be counted on the first floor and on the balcony underneath the organ pipes. Any guests for whom the balcony was inaccessible was invited to sit on the first floor of the cathedral.

The Rt. Rev. Catherine Roskam then led the Convention in devotions and in singing *Come Down O Love Divine*.

Bishop Smith then called upon the Rt. Rev. James Curry to introduce the keynote speaker, the Rt. Rev. Dinis Singulane, Bishop of the Diocese of Lebombo in Mozambique. Bishop Singulane offered us three words as a refrain to his ministry as well as his keynote address: Hosanna, Amen, Alleluia. He invited us to identify common mission. He spoke of the one common head of mission, Jesus Christ. Jesus came to give life and to give it abundantly. We if embrace those words, we hear Jesus calling us to, together, fight AIDS and Malaria. We are called to present Jesus Christ, priest, prophet and healer to the world. Hosanna, Amen, Alleluia. We have a strong common mission, We call upon God to act, we will praise God’s name, we will celebrate. Hosanna, Amen, Alleluia.

At 9:40 a.m. Bishop Smith then called upon Mr. Bates Lyons, chair of the Anti-Racism Committee, to speak on the work of the Committee. As part of his presentation he led an interactive exercise with members and guests of the Convention. He invited everyone present to choose a partner, a person sitting near them, preferably that they did not know, and for each person to take a few minutes to consider his/her heritage, where they and/or their family came from and how their heritage impacts who they are.

Bishop Smith then recognized the other members of the Anti-Racism Committee.

Bishop Smith then made two rulings. First he ruled that a person who is not a member of Convention needs a two-thirds vote of Convention to speak only in times when we are debating resolutions. It is not needed for a person to make a report to Convention. The second ruling was regarding applause. Bishop Smith asked that gestures of approval and disapproval not be expressed during debate of resolutions. At other times, he invited people to express themselves with applause as the Spirit moved them.

Bishop Smith then introduced Emily Perow who in turn introduced members of the youth delegation to General Convention in Columbus, Ohio: Charlotte Green (Christ Church, Greenwich); Jake Butler (St. John’s, Bristol); Christina Weaver (All Saint’s, Oakville); and Rachel Downs (St. Paul’s, Norwalk).

Bishop Smith then called upon Bates Lyons, the chair of the Program and Budget Committee to offer his report. Mr. Lyons presented the 2007 budget. He thanked the committee for their good work and time. He referred delegates of Convention to the narrative budget in their packets.

Mr. Guy Cambria, treasurer of the Diocese, then spoke about the finances of the Diocese. He referred to the report in the diocesan newspaper on parish giving to the Diocese. It showed that the average pledge to the Diocese had fallen back to 10.1%. He also reminded people that the annual audit of the Diocese was available to persons for review after its formal approval by BDEC. Mr. Cambria declared the Diocese is in compliance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). He noted that not every deanery was represented on the Finance Committee, and asked those deaneries without representation to appoint someone so that the Committee would have full representation.

Bishop Smith thanked Guy Cambria for his ministry and care of the finances of our Diocese.

At 10:25 a.m. Bishop Smith called upon Kate Smith to speak about the Bishop’s Fund for Children 5K Race. The Fund has been in existence for 11 years. The last race was held on May 20, 2006 and raised approximately \$33,000. Ms. Smith thanked everyone who was involved in helping the race happen. A new award was given to the parish that pledged the most to the Bishop’s Fund 5K Race. The recipient for 2006 was St. Michael’s, Naugatuck. In 2007, the race will be on May 19.

The Bishop asked for a motion to accept the reports written in the “Reports to the Annual Convention” as presented by title. On motion and vote, the reports were accepted.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP AND DIOCESAN EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Bishop and Diocesan Executive Council consist of the Bishop, two Bishops Suffragan, and one clerical and one lay delegate from each of the fourteen deaneries. The Bishop may appoint up to six additional members at large. The Treasurer, the Chancellor, the Canon for Stewardship and Administration (Director of Administration & Finance) are ex-officio members. The Canon to the Ordinary serves as an appointed advisor.

The Executive Council is charged by Canon with: Collecting and allocating funds within the limits of the budgets adopted by the Diocesan Convention; exercising the full power and authority of the Diocese between sessions of the Convention in most matters; establishing and maintaining program initiatives; and serving as a council of advice to the Bishop.

In 2005, the Executive Council met four times as follows: February 26 - Diocesan House, Hartford; June 8 - Diocesan House, Hartford; September 7 - Diocesan House, Hartford; December 7 - Diocesan House, Hartford.

In collaboration with its committees, the Council provided oversight for Diocesan activities in many areas. In that process, they dealt with several issues in 2005, including:

1. Accepted the budget for 2005 and the pledges to support the funding which had not improved significantly from 2004. That inaction prompted the creation of a Funding Task Force.
2. Set the date for the Annual 2006 Convention as 10/20 & 10/21 in Hartford.
3. Reviewed and accepted the FASB, GAAS compliant, combined, annual audits and management letter from the diocesan auditors, Carrlin, Charron & Rosen, P.C., for the financial statements for 2004.
4. Accepted the recommendation of the Insurance Board to increase the rates by 8% for the Group Life Medical Dental Program (GLMD) based on a factor that was much lower than industry rates; and they reported some stability in the marketplace with a 12% increased rate for the Province I Property Casualty program effective January 1, 2006 which enhanced the retention fund in the Provincial program as a means of controlling cost.
5. Received the financial statements from the Finance Committee on a periodic basis, and through that committee reviewed them for eventual audit.
6. Worked with the Program & Budget Committee to present a budget for 2006 to the Annual Convention in October 2005 under the leadership of its chairman, A. Bates Lyons.
7. Approved the use of the Shepard Estate in Bristol by the Shepard Meadows Riding Centre, Inc., a therapeutic program for children and adults using horse riding as the therapy tool.
8. Approved the creation of a Hurricane Relief Task Force to coordinate and oversee the myriad parish activities in the wake of Katrina, Wilma and Rita hurricanes in MS and LA.
9. Refined the role and procurement of the Board members of the Trinity Waterbury Fund and the Harrub Trust.
10. Acting as the Missionary Society, authorized the sale of Calvary Episcopal Church, Bridgeport upon the merger with St. George's Church to be known as Calvary/St. George's Episcopal Church.
11. Kept up to date in discussing the ongoing activities of 5 Connecticut parishes allied with the American Anglican Council (AAC) and processed the civil suit brought in the Federal Court against the Diocese, the Bishop and several staff members; and further kept pace with the attendant impact on finances and legal representation in the foregoing matter.
12. Continued discussion with the Diocesan House Task Force in moving toward seeking permits for the renovation of Diocesan House.
13. Accepted the *Model Policies for the Protection of Children* as presented by the Pastoral Response Committee and Coordinator.

Sitting as the Missionary Society, the Executive Council approved the following loans from the Revolving Loan Fund and from the Missionary Society (MS):

The Council acting as the Missionary Society also ratified the 2006 grants for the Trinity Fund (So. Norwalk) Committee totaling \$42,375.00; and further noted that the grants for the Trinity Fund (Waterbury) and Harrub Trust would be granted in 2006.

The Council is your "vestry" between conventions and takes its leadership role seriously in its plenary activity and through its committee structures. The members are committed to share both their time and gifts to the larger church including their availability to visit parish vestries, deaneries and forums. You are asked to invite them to your parishes – and you are invited to attend our council meetings!

THE EPISCOPAL INVESTMENT FUNDS OF CONNECTICUT
Legal Title: Donations and Bequests for Church Purposes, Inc.
TRUSTEES REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2005

Established in 1863, Donations and Bequests for Church Purposes, Inc. has as its mission the receiving, safeguarding,

and investing of securities and property for the benefit of Episcopal parishes and organizations in the Diocese of Connecticut, and the providing of financial counsel and experienced investment management for eligible organizations. In 1987, the name was changed to The Episcopal Investment Funds of Connecticut with the legal title remaining as Donations and Bequests for Church Purposes, Inc.

The Trustees of the Funds serve five-year terms, are elected by the Board of Trustees, and appointed by the Bishop and whose membership is confirmed at Diocesan Convention. Membership is sought from the ranks of active and retired professionals as well as representatives of parish participants who have a variety of experiences in investment management, parish relations and marketing.

Under the Investment Advisory Services offered by Ennis Knupp of Chicago, State Street Bank & Trust Co., Boston is the custodian of the funds and performs administrative functions; The Fixed Income Fund is managed by PIMCO (Allianz) Funds (50%) Newport Beach, California and The Western Asset Management Co. (Legg-Mason) (50%) of Pasadena, California. The Equity Fund Investment Managers are: Dodge & Cox Stock Fund, San Francisco, CA (14%); Legg Mason Growth Trust (11%), State Street Bank Global Investment advisors Total Market Index Fund (49%) and EAFE Index Funds (9%); Euro Pacific Growth Fund (9%); Philadelphia Investment Advisors (8%). The Money Market Short Term Fund is provided by State Street Bank; and the Trustees manage the Social Responsibility Fund with the assistance of a Fund Consultant, Ms. Toni Gold. The participant record keeper is NRS (Northeast Retirement Services).

The markets provided a fair year in 2005 for participants in the fund prompting the trustees to seek and process a continuous flow of information from their advisors to insure a continued response to the conditions. The total fund value at the end of 2005 was \$90 million up from \$85 million in the prior year. The typical parish allocation of 60% Equity and 40% Fixed income total return was 6.1% for the year ending 12/31/05, yielding a 40 basis point advantage over the 60/40 balanced benchmark of 5.7%.

The Board met four times in 2005: April 19, 2005 – at Diocesan House, Hartford; June 28, 2005 – at Diocesan House, Hartford; September 13, 2005 – at Diocesan House, Hartford; December 6, 2005 – at Diocesan House, Hartford

The trustees monitored the activity of the funds during the fiscal year and report the following actions:

1. Reviewed reports from all the Investment Managers and the Social Responsibility Fund Consultants.
2. Continued the services of Bennett Consulting, Inc., Mr. Edmund T. Bennett, President, to write quarterly performance reports for participants and maintain the “Stewardship of Endowment” workshop forums he offers on a no cost basis to the parishes for which he made several visits in 2005.
3. Following an in-depth evaluation of a proposal from Philadelphia Investment Advisors, the trustees voted to move the current mutual fund position with Glenmede International Fund to a limited partnership with PIA to take advantage of a better expense ratio and equal performance projections.
4. Monitored the Northeast Retirement Services participant record keeping services and assisted in the redesign of report and electronic offerings to the parishes in 2005.
5. Reviewed the Social Responsibility Fund as to its structure, reporting and expansion while working toward new placements in its balance.
6. Continued a review of the charter including input from the Chancellor’s office.
7. Received the audited financial statements for all three funds from Harper and Whitfield, P.C., the retained auditing firm.
8. Approved the partial funding of a Financial Assistant position at Diocesan House to replace the Trust services once offered through State Street and subsequently U S Trust. Ms. Susan LaFreniere currently occupies that position.

In 2006 the Trustees will continue to work on the structure of the Social Responsibility Fund. It will continue to refine the reporting process to participants including enhanced website access. The Investment Committee will continue to offer workshop opportunities to parishes in a new format design for implementation in 2007, and the Trustees will maintain their goal of being extremely responsive to participant needs in difficult fiscal moments for parishes. They will concentrate on the asset mix within the funds to sustain good fiduciary offerings to the participants during 2006 and now track the spending plans of the participants on a quarterly basis.

Participants both current and potential are invited to meet with the Trustees at any time. Your trustees through a remarkable amount of hard work and offering of sage advice provide a product that serves the diocese and its parishes well. We are blessed by their willingness to serve.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION & FINANCE (Canon for Stewardship and Administration)

As one grows older and continues to seek the rewards of experience and new challenges, the more one notices that change is a constant factor in most operations. Thus it is for the Diocese of Connecticut. I cannot remember another time

in my twenty five years as a diocesan staff person that I have been able to accept new standards and brave the effects of those changes in the economic and institutional norms for this beloved institution. Despite the continued distractions of blatant legal and theological attacks on our structure and its leadership, we have faced into those realities without the crippling effects that those who inflict such attacks would intend, and we continue to respond to all facets of the gospel call. With income challenges still present, the Program and Budget Committee was able to present a budget capable of doing good works and maintaining most budget requests for 2006. The year-end diocesan fund balance was again sufficient for the auditors, the finance committee and the Executive Council to accept the unqualified audits and their attendant management letter, recognizing our full FASB, GAAS and GAAP compliance. A distribution of surplus funds from year-end balances included contributions for Katrina relief, the legal reserve fund, and the Bishops' Discretionary Funds.

The Insurance Board recommended an 8% increase in premium for 2006 with no increase in the levels of co-payments for prescription drug charges or medical services. The Board continued as a participant in the Province I Property/Casualty program and dealt with a more stable property insurance market but a less stable liability environment in both Employee Practices and Sexual Misconduct Liability coverages. The increase in premium for 2006 was held to 12%, well below industry comparisons. The pooling of the business of five of the seven dioceses in Province I has proven to be an effective way to deal with competitive underwriting markets, especially of church business for which it is extremely difficult to find adequate capacity. Your Insurance Board monitors the programs during the year and adjusts them as necessary. The need to re-appraise the diocesan properties will begin in late 2006 as a guide to aid the underwriters in fairly pricing the program and promoting good risk management. Under the able leadership of Mr. R. Donald MacDougall, the Board continues to give many hours of volunteer expertise to serve you well with these solid programs.

The Episcopal Investment Funds (Donations and Bequests, Inc.) enjoyed moderate market conditions in 2005 and finished the year with returns that exceeded their benchmarks. The trustees also voted to accept the recommendations of their advisors to re-align a foreign investment position in the Equity Fund in order to respond to a more favorable fee structure without sacrificing performance. The trustees acknowledged the continued Council recommendation for a spending plan rate of 4% and began quarterly monitoring the spending rates of the participants. The fund continues to offer educational resources for the stewardship of parish endowments and is exploring a new workshop format for 2007. The Social Responsibility Fund reviewed its loans to current intermediaries, the guidelines for its placements and operation, and authorized the search for new borrowers and investors. Your trustees continue to be a steady presence in difficult markets and provide many hours of their expertise for this important part of our parish and diocesan fiscal lives.

Our administrative department continues to provide exceptional work for those whom they serve. I was supported by the following staff in 2005/2006: Louise Boehm my insurance and administrative assistant in her nineteenth year on our staff; Guy Cambria, Jr., volunteer Diocesan Treasurer; Cindy Winslow, part-time accounting projects CPA; Susan LaFreniere, part-time financial administrative assistant; Pat Georgeady, Accounting Supervisor; Shirley McGarry, bookkeeper, Annmarie T. Martin, receptionist; Sharron Ring, Production Assistant; and Torre Skjerli as Custodian, as well as the part-time presence of five college student interns at different times during the spring and summer of 2005: Ms. Tokunbo Green, Ms. Melanie Furrer, Mr. Jose Martinez, Ms. Mary-Beth McDowell, Ms. Sasha McKenney. These young adults provide a tremendous service in specially assigned projects, which they handle efficiently and cheerfully to conclusion. Archival Assistant Meg Smith and her intern assistant, Evelyn Greene round out the entire team of wonderfully dedicated and skilled staff who meet the daily demands presented to them with willingness and grace. I am always bolstered by their loyalty and faithfulness to their servant ministries.

Now in my 26th year on the Diocesan House staff and buffeted by the aforementioned challenges that make this job so interesting and albeit at times frustrating, I pray for a return to a stable church in Connecticut and in the larger communion - fully recognizing it will not look the same as in the past; but which will allow us to do God's work without the horrible distractions that divide us. Continued legal challenges tax my understanding of scripture and I still yearn for the collective wisdom and patience to bring closure to those battles. I give thanks for God's abundant love and nurture in my journey!

TREASURER'S REPORT

The year 2005 was much busier and its work more complex than that of the previous year. The Committee met four times during the year: February 15, May 17, September 6 and November 29. In its normal course of business the Committee reviews the financial statements of the Treasurer, the Missionary Society, Camp Washington and monitors them relative to their budgets, reviews their audit, and considers all other aspects of their financial lives.

In addition to its regular work, the Committee dealt with a number of new items which came before it. Included in this process was the consideration and effect of adjustment to the budget for the five parishes that have decided not to pledge to the Diocese, the issue of the late payment of insurance premiums that has now stabilized, the sale of a parcel of land at Camp Washington and an in-depth review of the submission of both parochial reports and parish audits, both of which are of great concern to the Committee.

The Committee also oversaw the hiring of a consultant to review the administrative function of the Diocese that had to do with the financial aspects as well as the role of the Canon for Administration and his Assistant and the structure that would best serve the Diocese in the future. That work was completed in 2006 and the recommendations are now being implemented. The Committee also administers the revolving loan fund and has a representative on the Funding Task Force.

I am happy to report that the Committee works very well together but I am very disappointed that the Committee is not at full strength and that we must ask the same members to participate in this important function year after year. It is my hope that in the future people will step forward and help us with our work.

As usual our thanks go out to all who make this committee successful. To the parishes who work hard to maintain their pledge, to the Canon for Administration, his staff and the Bishops who support us all.

REPORT OF THE ARCHIVAL ASSISTANT

This year marked a period of changes and improvements in several areas:

- New equipment for temperature and humidity controls to preserve the physical integrity of the collections
- Acquisition of supplies for the preservation of antique manuscripts, photographs, and artifacts
- My attendance and certification at a workshop given by the Society of American Archivists on "Describing Archives a Content Standard"
- Adoption of the new SAA standard to describe the Archives & examining the effect on future web pages
- Adoption of Library of Congress cataloging for books and monographs in the collection and initiated the cataloging of the reference collection
- A spatial analysis and map of the two main vaults in the Archives
- Various projects to address space considerations, labeling and record retention.
- Creation of a new "Record Group" for the Rt. Rev. John Williams (4th Diocesan of Connecticut)
- Inventory of periodical holdings, compilation of several parish abstracts, processing of several multi-drawer (or boxed) files
- Consultation with nearly a dozen parish archivists regarding retention of papers for historical and legal purposes; and an on-site visit with the archivists of St. John's Church in Waterbury
- Reference questions: 87 by telephone; 38 by ground mail; and 174 by e-mail (or 299 to date; not including "in-house" questions or consultation with parishioners during visits to the archives)
- Worked with 3 parish archives committees that are preparing histories for anniversary celebrations and provided reference assistance for the parishes participating in the "New Dollars/New Partners" for Sacred spaces
- Accepted the transfer of two important collections: the papers of Bishop Suffragan Wilfrido Ramos-Orench and all recent historical files of the Episcopal Church Women of Connecticut
- As a member of the Disaster Planning Response Task force, I have arranged to host the North East Document Conservation Center, which will offer a free disaster planning workshop early in 2007.

During February of this year, the Diocese of Connecticut noted with sadness the death of our long-time Archivist and Historiographer, the Rev. Dr. Kenneth Walter Cameron, at the age of 97. The author of *The Historiographer of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut* and more than 300 works on American literature and history, Dr. Cameron succeeded in methodically collecting a myriad of documents and building archival collections. During his thirty-four year tenure in service of our diocese, he published books about the history of the Diocese of Connecticut; inventoried and published the holdings of the archives; collected a significant microfilm series of the letters of early Anglican missionaries in America; assembled an impressive 19th century religious pamphlet collection (transferred last year to the Episcopal Church archives) and transcribed important primary-source letters and manuscripts into single-bound volumes by author. Dr. Cameron was instrumental in designing both the "Seabury" and the "Lindsley Vaults," which remain, as of this writing, "state of the art." Many delegates living today may still remember his reports to the Annual Convention, where he regaled his audiences with historical tidbits and humor. His distinguished contributions - his "labor of love" - expanded the depth and breadth of the archives collection in keeping with the tradition of his predecessors.

Finally, again as last year, I am indebted to the knowledgeable and steadfast members of the Archives Committee, Peter Knapp, chairman, and the continued advice and support of Canons Jerry Carroon and Jack Spaeth. Student interns Melanie Furrer, Nike Green, and Jose Martinez deserve special thanks, and especially Archival Intern, Evelyn Green, whose contributions are many. I am constantly blessed to be a member of the Diocesan staff, and "count it all joy" to continue to explore with parish archivists and historians the innumerable resources of the Diocesan Archives. The collections invariably reveal fascinating material.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Through the Children's Ministries & Christian Education office, parishes and individuals have been supported in numerous ways this past year. Largely determined by the needs and requests from people of our diocese, this ministry focuses on Christian formation and education programs for children, youth and adults.

When this program area of the Diocese of Connecticut began 10 years ago (as a part-time, 3 hour per week consultant), there was a hunger for connections, resources and support to assist our congregations in developing stronger education programs for children. This continues today, and now involves youth and adult formation. Today, there is a known contact for Christian formation (volunteer or staff) for 99% of our congregations. Each has access to a quarterly newsletter, "A Child CONN-Nexus" as well as a monthly e-newsletter, "Connecticut IN-Formation" which has over 1,100 subscribers throughout the diocese and Anglican Communion! The Diocesan Resource Center is now an updated library of over 1,000 volumes of print materials available to all parishes to borrow, free of charge. These include copies of curricula for children, youth and adults as well as numerous resources for stewardship, worship, mission, service, advocacy, family, spirituality and seasonal materials. Our diocesan labyrinth and World Peace Village is always out, being used in congregations - just as they are meant to be.

Teacher training is now affordable and accessible to all who desire continuing education. A Godly Play workshop is held every Spring and Fall, and Journey to Adulthood workshops are offered at least once a year. In addition, workshop

days are held for particular topics of interest as well as offerings that feature educational resources at many diocesan training events, such as the annual stewardship, environmental and liturgy conferences. The Commission on Christian Formation is on the threshold of bringing educational ministries to a new parish collaborative level; please support them with your parish involvement of representation and communication.

Connecticut is at the forefront of being known as a model diocese for Christian formation, most realized in the collaboration of many diocesan offices – Christian education, youth ministry, pastoral care & safe church training, Camp Washington and Ordinands’ Training to name a few. To support all these areas of formation, our website (www.ctdiocese.org/resources/christianed.shtml) contains free materials for all; many other dioceses, seminaries and The Episcopal Church Center have a link to our pages.

As this will be my last report to Convention, I would like to take the opportunity to give thanks for the many individuals who have supported me and blessed me in my ministry in this diocese. Through the years, all our bishops (including Bishops Coleridge and Ramos) have made ministry to, for and with children a priority. This has grown to life long learning. I am so grateful to the leadership of Bishop Smith. He has been a joy to work with and I have been proud to be part of his staff. Bishop Curry has also embodied the meaning of mutual ministry to me – understanding that we are all called to the ministry of the priesthood by virtue of our baptism. It has been an honor to share ministry with him. Lastly, my cohort and office-mate, Emily Perow; her welcome and hospitality to me as well of sense of humor has kept me from taking myself too seriously while also sharing her passion and expertise in youth ministry.

It has been a privilege to share ministry with so many of you throughout these past ten years. I will miss being with you, but know we will still be connected. Through your gifts and encouragement, you have given me the courage and skills necessary to begin a new ministry, serving Episcopalians (and others) in Christian formation and resource development on a national level.

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT

The Youth Ministries Program in the diocese had a busy year and will continue with great momentum and excitement into 2007. Many parishes starting and continuing with ministry to, for and with young people

We held a Senior High Overnight in February hosted by St. John’s, North Haven. Our numbers this year doubled in size. The teenagers discovered, discussed and celebrated what it means to get back to the basics of Christianity and truly what it means to be pure at heart.

Our Junior High event this year was the first weekend in March and it was filled to capacity for a fourth year running. We had a total of 135 people present. The youth had a chance to discover and discuss how God is always there for them in the midst of peer pressure, when there seems like no way out. We had young musicians and it was one of the best Junior High events we’ve had in the past three years.

The Youth Ministry office collaborated with the Christian Formation and held a quiet day for Christian Educators and Youth Ministers. The two offices also oversee a Christian Formation commission for the diocese. We also purchased a labyrinth that we are happy to share with the diocese.

We took a total of 13 youth, young adults and adults to the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Columbus, Ohio. They had a chance to discover, celebrate and praise God with hundreds of Episcopalians from across the world.

Speakers were asked to give their names and parish affiliations to the assistant secretary at the microphone before they speak.

Bishop Smith then called upon the Rev. Joseph L. Pace, chair of the Resolutions Committee, to present the resolutions.

RESOLUTION # 1 – Minimum Salary Schedule for Clergy for 2007

Submitted by: The Personnel Policy Committee of the Bishop and Diocesan Executive Council

1. **2007 MINIMUM SALARY SCHEDULE (For all stipendiary clergy including transitional deacons):** The following schedule (w/comparisons from 2002 ff.) has been recommended by the Personnel Policy Committee to be ratified by the Executive Council at its 09/6/06 meeting for subsequent presentation to the Diocesan Convention on October 21, 2006, for its approval:

Plus housing and utilities (i.e. church owned housing or suitable housing allowance for clergy owned or rented housing), life insurance with a \$50,000 minimum face value in excess of Pension Fund life insurance, Diocesan comprehensive group medical and dental insurance program for clergy person, legal dependents and domestic partners, Church Pension Fund Premiums, and Housing Equity Allowance where applicable.

* This salary figure represents a 3.5% increase over the 2006 salary schedule. The figures are based on projections using trends and figures available through 7/31/06. There is no additional base increase built into the increment.

@ **The diocesan travel/ex per mile rate of \$0.445** (the same as the current Federal GSA and IRS rates for 2006) remains the same for 2007 at this juncture and as it may later be amended during the year. As announced at the convention in 1998 and in force year in most parishes since then, the flat travel allowance of prior years was replaced in 2000 with a recommended Accountable Plan Allowance for business related travel and reasonable professional expenses as submitted and documented on a regular basis. For IRS tax purposes, The Personnel Policy Committee recommends that parishes adopt this method of business travel and professional expense and that the parish provide an adequate budget amount to accommodate for this documented expense reimbursement. The committee does not recommend a flat allowance. Mileage rate adjustments will be announced as amended.

! **The Continuing Education amount** for 2007 stays the same at \$750.00 for continuing education and for a contribution toward the expense of the annual clergy conference. It is not intended as cash compensation but as an offset to actual educational/conference expense. A week of continuing education time away from the parish is an integral part of this allowance.

The Deacons/Priests first full year rate is for the first year following ordination to the DIACONATE. Beyond that first year, the rate used should be under the category of full time assistant or Priest in Charge as appropriate.

+ **From date of Ordination to the Diaconate:** Rather than prorating the increase for the exact date of ordination, it is recommended that the incremental step be paid as of January 1st for the entire calendar year. The incremental step applies to Assistants and Priest in Charge.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved that the resolution be adopted. The motion was seconded.

Canon Jack Spaeth presented the resolution.

Mr. Mark Ricci, Trinity Church, Portland), spoke to the resolution.

The resolution passed as presented.

RESOLUTION # 2 - 2007 Diocesan Budget

Resolved: That the 222nd Diocesan Convention adopts the Diocesan Budget for 2007 as proposed and appended to this resolution.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved that the resolution be adopted. It was seconded. Mr. Bates Lyons, chair of the Program and Budget Committee, spoke to the resolution. He noted his comments from earlier in the day.

Dr. Robert Eldridge, St. Peter's, Milford, asked for clarification on Schedule F – funding for Episcopal-related ministries at Yale University and the University of Connecticut. He wondered about funding for other state universities.

Bishop Smith ruled that it is not the role of Convention of amend budget line items. He referred the comments to the Bishop and Diocesan Executive Committee.

The Rev. Tom White, St. Peter's, South Windsor asked for clarification on Schedule C. He wanted a more specific breakdown of grant amounts and details for which the grant was made.

Canon John Spaeth noted that the grants for Schedule C are toward the operating budget of a parish. The Council does not look for specificity for these grants that help fund the operating budgets.

The Rt. Rev. James Curry offered a point of clarification regarding schedule F. He noted that the line item "other grants" for \$15,000 was used for funding ecumenical partnerships for ministry with the state university system, known as "The Connecticut Commission on United Ministry for Higher Education."

The resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Laura Ahrens announced the results of the first ballot.

At 11:15 a.m. the Convention Eucharist was celebrated in the Cathedral. The Celebrant was the Rt. Rev. Andrew D. Smith, bishop of Connecticut, and the homilist was the Rt. Rev. Catherine Roskam.

Following the Eucharist, the Convention broke for lunch.

The Convention was reconvened and called to order at 1:40 p.m..

Bishop Roskam offered devotional prayers and the Convention members and guests sang *What Wondrous Love is This*.

The Bishop called upon the Rev. Canon Marge Roccoberton to introduce the postulants and candidates for Holy Orders in the Diocese. Those who were present were recognized.

Taking the resolutions out of order, the Convention was then asked to consider Resolution #9, on the merger of the parishes of Christ Church, West Haven, and St. John's by the Sea, West Haven, into one parish.

RESOLUTION #9 – To Merge the Parishes of Christ Church, West Haven and St. John's by the Sea, West Haven into one parish.

Resolved: That under the provisions of Canon I, Section 16 of the Constitutions and Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut, the Bishop and Standing Committee have approved the merger of the parishes of Christ Episcopal Church, West Haven and St. John's by the Sea Episcopal Church, West Haven, into one parish to be known as Church of the Holy Spirit Episcopal Church, West Haven, and be it further

Resolved: That the action of the Bishop and Standing Committee be ratified by the 222nd Annual Convention and that the new parish congregation of the Church of the Holy Spirit Episcopal Church, West Haven be welcomed into union with the Diocese of Connecticut, and that their representatives be recognized at this time.

Submitted by the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Connecticut.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the adoption of the resolution. The resolution was seconded.

The Rev. Mark Robinson presented the resolution and asked that the rules of Convention regarding applause be suspended so that people would be able to applaud if the resolution passed.

The Rev. Jerry Zimmerman, rector emeritus of Christ Church, West Haven, noted that Christ Church is the second oldest parish in this diocese (est. 1723) (Christ Church, Stratford is the oldest (est. 1709)). St. John's by the Sea was a mission church of Christ Church.

The resolution was adopted as presented. Members of the Parish came forward and received the applause of the Convention. The doxology was sung.

The Rev. Joe Pace then moved Convention to Resolution #3 noting this is the resolution's second reading. This resolution, passed by the 2005 Diocesan Convention, requires an affirmative vote at two consecutive Diocesan Conventions, since it involves a change in the Constitution.

RESOLUTION # 3 - Amending Diocesan Constitution to name elected Lay Deputies and Alternates to General Convention as ex-officio members of Diocesan Convention

Submitted by: The Rev. Ellen Tillotson, Trinity Church, Torrington

RESOLVED: That the Constitution of the Diocese of Connecticut be amended in the following manner: In Article IV, paragraph 5, to read "Lay members of the Diocesan Executive Council and of the Standing Committee and all elected lay Deans and Sub-Deans *and current elected Lay Deputies and Alternate Deputies to General Convention* shall be ex-officio members of the Convention unless they be otherwise elected delegates from their respective Parishes and Mission Stations. (New wording is italicized and underlined.)

Explanation: Our elected deputies to General Convention serve the Diocese and the wider church in ways in which is important that they be allowed voice, vote and seat in our convention. They bring a perspective of the wider church to us and their counsel ought to be welcome. Deputies are elected to serve until the election for the next set of Deputies is held; then, presumably, those newly elected would serve as members of convention.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the adoption of the resolution. The resolution was seconded. Ms. Rose Fischera-Eagan, Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford, was called upon to present the resolution. She is not a member of convention so she needed two-thirds vote of convention to speak. Receiving this, she presented the resolution.

The Rev. Jerry Zimmerman asked for clarification regarding when the delegates would be able to vote at Diocesan Convention. Bishop Smith noted that once a deputy to General Convention was elected by the Diocesan Convention, they would be eligible to vote until a new delegation is elected at a Diocesan Convention.

The resolution was adopted as presented.

RESOLVED: That the 222nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut urges the Bishop of Connecticut and the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Connecticut to publicly and openly disassociate themselves and the Diocese of Connecticut from the limitation on the consecration of bishops contained in B033, passed at General Convention in June 2006.

Explanation: B033, passed on the last legislative day of General Convention 2006, urges that bishops and standing committees not consent to the consecration of any candidate for bishop whose "manner of life" might be challenging to the larger Anglican Church. B033 is aimed, without naming them, at partnered gay and lesbian candidates, preventing the consent to their consecration, which, if named, would violate canon law. The resolution asks for prophetic leadership from the bishop in publicly and openly refuting the implications of B033 and declaring his support of partnered gay and lesbian candidates as well as his willingness to advocate for the consent to consecration of a partnered gay or lesbian elected as bishop in this church.

Text of B033 from General Convention:

Resolved, That the 75th General Convention receive and embrace The Windsor Report's invitation to engage in a process of healing and reconciliation; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention therefore call upon Standing Committees and bishops with jurisdiction to exercise restraint by not consenting to the consecration of any candidate to the episcopate whose manner of life presents a challenge to the wider church and will lead to further strains on communion.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the adoption of the resolution. The resolution was seconded. The Rev. James Bradley, St. John's Church, Waterbury was called upon to present the resolution.

The Rev. Scott Hankins, Christ Church, Norwich spoke to the resolution.

Steve Hudspeth, St. Matthew's, Wilton offered the following substitute resolution: "Be it resolved that this Convention affirms that we do not exclude any person from consideration to bishop based on the world's identifications and categorizations, but instead elect our bishops based on our discernment process with the guidance of the Holy Spirit of each candidate's heart and call and that we trust this process to raise up for us God's choice."

The substitute was not offered according to the rules of order and was ruled out of order.

The Rev. Joanne Neal-Richards, Mary Ellen Kania, St. Peter's, Cheshire, Mary Lou Shoemaker, Epiphany, Durham, the Rev. Mark Given, Christ Church, Middle Haddam, the Rev. Ben Brockman, St. Paul's, Fairfield spoke to the original resolution.

Alice Griffin, Christ Church, Roxbury proposed the substitute resolution that Mr. Hudspeth proposed earlier. It was presented within the rules of order:

Be it resolved that this convention affirms that we do not exclude any person from consideration to Bishop based on the world's identifications and categorizations, but instead elect our Bishops based on our discernment process with the guidance of the Holy Spirit of each candidate's heart and call and that we trust this process to raise up for us God's choice.

The Rev. Janet Waggoner, St. Matthew's, Wilton and the Rev. Mary Ann Osborn, St. Paul's, Fairfield spoke to the amendment.

If the substitute resolution was approved, the original resolution would no longer be considered.

The substitute resolution was put to vote and it failed to pass. Debate returned to the original resolution.

The Rev. Matthew Caulkins, St. Timothy's, Fairfield; the Rev. Maggie Minnick, Church of the Holy Trinity, Middletown; Karl Smith, St. Paul's Mission for the Deaf, Hartford; Peter Treffers, St. James, New Haven; and Betsy Adams, St. Francis, Stamford, spoke to the resolution.

The Rev. Linda Spiers, Trinity, Collinsville, offered an amendment It was seconded.

The amendment offered a revised version of the resolution. The amended resolution would read:

RESOLVED: That the 222nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut urges the Bishop of Connecticut and the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Connecticut to publicly and openly live in disappointment and opposition for themselves and for the Diocese of Connecticut from the limitation on the consecration of bishops contained in B033,

passed at General Convention in June 2006.

The Rev. Linda Spiers spoke to the amendment.

The vote was called on the amendment. The amendment did not pass.

The question on the original resolution was called. The resolution did not pass.

The Bishop thanked everyone for their participation in the work just finished.

RESOLUTION # 5 - Election of a Bishop Suffragan

RESOLVED: That the 222nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut urges the Rt. Rev. Andrew Smith to take the steps necessary to delay the election of a Bishop Suffragan until the church at large rejects the limitations on consecrations contained in B033, passed at General Convention in June 2006.

Explanation: B033 passed on the last legislative day of General Convention 2006, urges that bishops and standing committees not consent to the consecration of any candidate for bishop whose "manner of life" might be challenging to the larger Anglican Church. B033 is aimed, without naming them, at partnered gay and lesbian candidates, preventing the consent to their consecration, which, if named, would violate canon law. This resolution asks for prophetic leadership from our bishop in refusing to allow the election of Bishop Suffragan under the restrictions of B033.

Text of B033 from General Convention:

Resolved, That the 75th General Convention receive and embrace The Windsor Report's invitation to engage in a process of healing and reconciliation; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention therefore call upon Standing Committees and bishops with jurisdiction to exercise restraint by not consenting to the consecration of any candidate to the episcopate whose manner of life presents a challenge to the wider church and will lead to further strains on communion.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the adoption of the resolution. The resolution was seconded. The Rev. James Bradley, St. John's, Waterbury, was called upon to present the resolution.

The Rev. Jonathan Folts, St. John's Essex and the Rev. Scott Hankins, Christ Church, Norwich spoke to the resolution.

Steve Hudspeth, St. Matthew's, Wilton offered the same substitute resolution offered for Resolution #4: "Be it resolved that this convention affirms that we do not exclude any person from consideration to bishop based on the world's identifications and categorizations, but instead elect our bishops based on our discernment process with the guidance of the Holy Spirit of each candidate's heart and call and that we trust this process to raise up for us God's choice."

He then spoke to the substitute resolution.

The Rev. Charles Hoffman, Grace Church, Old Saybrook, raised a point of order saying that this had already been considered and defeated. The Bishop ruled that this was a substitution for a new resolution and a different context. The Rev. Charles Hoffman appealed to the Chancellor. The Chancellor ruled that the delegates of Convention must vote on whether to support the Rev. Hoffman's challenge. The vote to support the challenge failed.

The Bishop reminded the Convention that it was still on the substitute resolution.

The resolution was called for a vote. The vote was inconclusive. The Bishop asked for delegates to vote again by a show of hands which the tellers then counted. Results showed 137 for and 147 against. The substitute resolution failed.

The Rev. Kate Heichler, Christ Church, Bethany and the Rev. Joanne Neal-Richard spoke to the original resolution.

The resolution was called for a vote. Resolution #5 did not pass.

RESOLUTION # 6 - Universal Health Care In Connecticut

Submitted by the Social Concerns and Witness Committee and the Rev. Brendan McCormick, St. Paul's, Wallingford.

RESOLVED: That the 222nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut calls on the Governor and state legislature to address the state's health care crisis in a comprehensive manner and adopt a plan to achieve universal health care in Connecticut. Universal health care is defined as a system of coverage that provides quality, affordable health care for all. And, be it further

RESOLVED: That this Convention directs the chair of the Social Concerns and Witness Committee to communicate this resolution to the appropriate State authorities.

Explanation: In the state of Connecticut 356,000 citizens do not have health care insurance. The State of Connecticut is spending \$15 billion annually on health care; yet the ranks of the state's uninsured and underinsured are growing. 80% of the state's uninsured are employed, many of work for small businesses. Each year health care costs are rising at high rates, causing businesses to shift health care costs to employees in the form of increased co-pays, deductions, increased employee contributions - or decreased or reduced health care benefits. Many people whose income is above eligibility levels for state aid for healthcare costs do not have enough income to afford health care insurance, and are less likely to obtain health care when it is needed. Increasing numbers of people are at-risk of losing health insurance due to employment change, job loss, and changes in their family - causing many to make life decisions based on health care coverage. The current system is costing individuals, families, business, health care providers, and the state too much. We're spend-

ing more and getting less, and not solving the problem. This is having a negative impact on the state's economy, and is undermining the ability of Connecticut corporations to compete in a global economy.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the adoption of the resolution. The resolution was seconded.

Ms. Lynne Ide, St. Paul's, Windham, and former member of the Social Concerns and Witness Committee was called upon to present the resolution. Ms. Ide is not a member of convention and needed a two thirds vote of convention in order to speak to the resolution. She received the votes and presented the resolution.

The Rev. Brendon McCormick, St. Paul's, Wallingford, spoke to the resolution.

The Rev. Thomas White, St. Peter's, So. Windsor, offered a friendly amendment asking Lynne Ide to add the points noted in her comments to the resolution. They were as follows:

1. covers everyone
2. follows you wherever you go - regardless of employment and family status
3. sustainable to the economy
4. affordable to low and middle income families
5. quality care focused on prevention and patient-centered

The amendment was moved and seconded.

Diane Loring, St. Paul's, Brookfield and Robert Keyes, St. Stephen's, Ridgefield, spoke to the amendment.

Upon vote, the amendment passed.

Alice Griffin, Christ Church, Roxbury, Robert Eldridge, St. Peter's, Milford and the Rev. Nicholas Porter, Trinity, Southport spoke to the amended resolution.

The amended resolution passed.

RESOLUTION # 7 - Affordable Housing in Connecticut

Submitted by Social Concerns and Witness Committee

RESOLVED: That the 222nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut reaffirms Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights which states that everyone is entitled to a standard of living adequate for health and well being of self and family including food, clothing, housing, and medical care. And be it further

RESOLVED: That as the rising cost of housing for the poor in Connecticut is depriving thousands of the right to affordable housing, this Convention strongly urges members of the state legislature and the Governor: 1) to restore the rental assistance programs to the previous level of 2600 families; 2) to appropriate substantial funds from the Housing Trust Fund for construction and rehabilitation of moderate and low income housing; 3) to mandate towns and municipalities to require developers of multi-unit housing projects either to set aside some units for affordable housing, or contribute a portion of the costs to an affordable housing fund. And, be it further

RESOLVED: That this Convention directs the Chair of the Social Concerns and Witness Committee to communicate this resolution to the appropriate State authorities.

Explanation: The best definition of human oppression is the deprivation of basic human rights.

In Connecticut housing costs have grown to such an extent that many lower-middle class people and families cannot afford to own their home, and the poor are being deprived of the right to affordable housing. Among the poor, homelessness is on the rise, causing extreme deprivation and often, family breakup. This oppression also has the effect of decreasing the rights of children to benefit from education, as it is difficult to provide education to children whose families are homeless.

In recent years the state has succumbed to pressures to hold down taxes by drastically reducing rental subsidies and eliminating funds for affordable housing construction. It is to be noted that rental subsidies, while helping families to pay their rent, tend to keep rents up, and a great percentage of recent land development in Connecticut has been for high-cost housing that further increases land prices, and thereby, housing costs.

Consequently, many municipalities have realized that new developments must set aside some units as affordable housing, or contribute a portion of the costs to an affordable housing trust fund. It is increasingly recognized that shortage of affordable housing for workers is hurting economic development.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the resolution and it was seconded.

Archibald Stuart was called upon to present the resolution. Mr. Stuart is not a member of convention and needed a two thirds vote of convention in order to speak to the resolution. He was granted permission to speak.

Bishop Smith called for the vote and it passed.

RESOLUTION # 8 - Human Rights: Immigration and Undocumented Workers

Submitted by: The Rev. Emmett Jarrett, TSSF; the Rev. Gail Keeney-Mulligan, St. John's, New Milford; the Rev. Margaret Minnick, Holy Trinity, Middletown; the Rev. James A. Mulligan; the Rev. Kyle Pedersen, St. Paul & St. James, New Haven; the Rev. Mark K. J. Robinson, Calvary, Stonington; the Rev. Mark Santucci, St. Mark's, Mystic

RESOLVED: That the 222nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut, urges the Congress of the United States to enact legislation to expand temporary workers' programs to include: 1) all persons who enter the United States and engage in meaningful work; and, 2) overseas workers offered employment in the United States through formal contractual arrangements in response to the labor needs of specific sections of the economy; and be it further

RESOLVED: That such temporary workers' programs include: the right to change employers, obtain a driver's license, access to education, particularly post-secondary education; and, benefits including appropriate mandated minimum hourly wage, Social Security, workers' compensation, healthcare and pension; and be it further

RESOLVED: That based upon a specified period of residence in the United States, such workers have the option of seeking permanent resident status, which could lead to naturalization; and be it further

RESOLVED: That Connecticut Episcopalians be urged to advocate in the public arena for human rights for immigrants and undocumented workers; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the submitters of this resolution communicate this resolution to the appropriate state and federal authorities.

Explanation: As members of The Episcopal Church, we believe that God the Creator “made of one blood all the peoples of the earth, and sent” Jesus Christ “to preach peace to those who are far off and to those who are near” (BCP, p. 100). The history of God’s people, from Abraham (Gen. 12:1-3) to Jesus and his disciples, shows a people who leave home and wander as strangers until they find a home amidst people who were there before them, in Canaan and in Nazareth. Holy Scripture remembers Israel’s origin as a migrant people by commanding them to cherish “the heart of a stranger” (Exod. 23:9) and to care for sojourners now dwelling in their midst (Lev. 19:33-34). Jesus built his community of disciples among the poor, the alien and the excluded in his culture, recognizing in a Canaanite woman a person of dignity and worth who, despite her alien status, should not be ignored (Mark 7:26-30). The United States of America was formed out of many peoples and cultures, most of whom came to these shores without documents. Some of our citizens were brought to these shores as slaves.

Estimates of the number of undocumented immigrants in the United States today range from 6 to 14 million. Many of these live and work in Connecticut, and are members of Episcopal and other churches. They have come among us to work, and their work assists in the building up of our community and nation. The economy of the United States needs these workers if it is to continue in prosperity. Over the next fifty years our country will probably experience labor shortages due to the retirement of the “baby boom” generation. More foreign-born workers will be a necessity for us. The system currently in place leaves millions of undocumented workers without legal status. They are often separated from their children and experience abuse in the workplace. Health and safety regulations, minimum wage laws, and statutory limits on hours worked do not cover these workers.

In an election year, the forces of “natives” are again rampant in our country. Some are exploiting the immigration issue to connect undocumented workers to terrorists, and to play on the fear of our people. The racism implicit in these accusations is unworthy of Christians and citizens. The emphasis on border security and the criminalization of immigrants is unworthy of a generous people. The 74th General Convention of The Episcopal Church adopted a resolution similar to the one proposed. Adoption of this resolution by the Diocese of Connecticut will place us firmly among the Christians and other people of faith who are seeking to “respect the dignity of every human being” (BP, p. 305).

Statement of Requirements to Implement the Resolution: The requirements to implement the resolution include a willingness on the part of Episcopal Church and diocesan leaders to take a stand on this justice issue. In financial terms, all that is required is postage to send the resolution to members of Congress and state officials.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the resolution and it was seconded.

The Rev. Emmet Jarrett, TSSF, St. Francis House, New London, and the Rev. Gail Keeney-Mulligan, St. John’s, New Milford, presented the resolution.

The Rev. Mark Robinson, Calvary Church, Stonington, spoke to the resolution.

Bishop Smith called for the vote and it passed.

The Rt. Rev. Andrew Smith thanked the Rev. Joe Pace for chairing the Committee on Resolutions and making the presentations.

The Rev. Joe Pace then presented the resolutions from the Committee on the Bishop’s Address. These were then handed out.

RESOLUTION #1 - Of the Committee on the Bishop’s Address

Resolved: That this 222nd Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut commends the Bishop for his leadership; thanks him for his patience; and supports his call to end dissension and the diversion of assets and energy within the diocese. We embrace the gospel values and imperatives in mission relationships, recognizing that we act in Christ out of a new spirit of generosity.

The Rev. Joe Pace presented the resolution.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the resolution and it was seconded.

The Rev. Charles Hoffman, Grace Church, Old Saybrook spoke to the resolution.

Bishop Smith turned over the duties of chairing the Convention to Bishop Curry so that he could speak to the resolution.

There was a motion to table the resolution and it was seconded. The votes were 91 in favor of tabling, and 171 against. The motion to table failed.

The vote on resolution #1 was called. The resolution failed.

RESOLUTION #2 - Of the Committee on the Bishop’s Address:

Resolved: That the 222nd Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut welcomes the opportunity to offer Christ’s blessing for same-sex committed partners who seek, in faith, the recognition, prayer and support of the Church for their lives as followers and servants of Christ.

The Rev. Joe Pace presented the resolution.

The Rev. Joe Pace moved the resolution and it was seconded.

The Rev. Ellendale Hoffman, Grace Church, Old Saybrook; the Rev. Scott Hankins, Christ Church, Norwich; the Rev. Salin Low, St. John’s, Pine Meadow; Stephen Mullens, Church of the Holy Spirit, West Haven; Stephen Hudspeth, St. Matthew’s, Wilton; Lawrence Greenspan, St. John’s, New Milford; the Rev. James Bradley, St. John’s, Waterbury; the Rev. Matthew Caulkins, St. Timothy’s, Fairfield; Sharon McNeal, Christ Church, Tashua; and the Rev. Bruce Mason, Trinity,

Torrington, spoke to the resolution.

There was a motion to table the resolution. It was seconded.

The motion to table failed.

Bishop Curry then called for the vote on Resolution #2. Prior to voting, Bishop Roskam was called upon to lead the Convention in prayer. Members and guests then sang *Ubi Caritas*.

At the vote, the Rt. Rev. James Curry ruled that the resolution passed.

The vote was challenged and a call received for a vote by counting the show of hands. There were 149 votes in favor and 121 votes against. The resolution passed.

The Rev. Dr. Laura J. Ahrens moved resolutions of thanks to the volunteers of the Cathedral Altar Guild, the Cathedral staff, Dean Pendleton, the Rev. Allison St. Louis and the retiring members of the Standing Committee (the Rev. Mark Robinson and Theresa Sharp). She also thanked the staff at the Capital Regional Community College and the members of the Executive Council. Great thanks were offered to the Diocesan House administration and production staff who gathered, produced and coordinated all the mailings, packets, handouts and registration information. The resolution passed by a show of hands.

The Rt. Rev. Andrew Smith reminded delegates to return the completed surveys for the Nominating Committee to a box in the baptistry.

Bishop Smith noted that the offering the Diocese of Lebombo, Mozambique taken during the convention Eucharist was just over \$5,200. He said the amount would be rounded up to \$6,000 by the Diocese as its gift.

Dr. Ahrens then reminded those assembled to vote on November 7th. She also announced the clergy retreat at Holy Family Retreat House in West Hartford on November 7, 8 and 9 and reminded clergy to send in their deposit.

The Rt. Rev. Andrew Smith then thanked the Rt. Rev. Catherine Roskam for serving as Chaplain to the Convention. He then called upon her to offer closing prayers. The closing hymn was *There's a Wideness in God's Mercy*.

Bishop Andrew Smith adjourned the Convention with his blessing.
